

Legacy Land Trust Preserve Name	County	Acreage	Site Details
Marston Preserve	Galveston	14.185	One of the few remaining heavily-wooded tracts of property in Dickinson. The property is bounded on one side by a Texas Parks and Wildlife tract, making for a larger protected open space.
Live Oaks Ranch Preserve	Waller	478.915	Located in the headwaters of the Cypress Creek watershed, this large property helps provide a flood buffer zone for downstream residents of Cypress Creek. The tract contains functioning wetlands that are excellent duck habitat. The prairie sections of the ranch provide habitat for ground nesting birds.
Nelson Farm Preserve	Harris and Waller	554.5952	The easement area is riparian land along Cypress Creek with current agricultural use (rice production). It is located within the Katy Prairie which is an important migratory stop-over and wintering area for migratory waterfowl, shorebirds and neotropical songbirds.
Baker Preserve	Harris	72.517	This property retains overflow waters from nearby tributary Greens Bayou in eastern Harris County. It contains an interesting mix of pine and hardwoods including red maple, tupelo swamp, palmetto flats as well as marsh depressions.
Felton Preserve	Galveston	366.1	A critical piece of the 1% remaining coastal prairie, this property represents an interdunal swale complex that is a severely threatened habitat type along the Texas Gulf Coast. The entire property is in the floodway of the Gulf of Mexico.
Curry Lake I Preserve	Montgomery	74	Located nearly adjacent to the West fork of the San Jacinto River, this property includes 25.4 acres of palustrine forested wetlands and an amazing interior water body (Curry Lake) that has almost 2,000 ft. of frontage and is prime duck habitat.
Bender Preserve	Harris	44	This tract is adjacent to Spring Creek in northern Harris County and includes 12.9 acres of palustrine forested wetlands. The tract has a particularly interesting array of ferns including netted chain fern and Japanese climbing fern among others.
Montgomery County Preserve	Montgomery	71	The first conservation easement in the state of Texas to be signed with a County, this property was set aside for low-impact recreational use for the public as well as to provide a natural flood buffer zone for Spring Creek.
Three Creeks Preserve	Washington	197	The easement area is undeveloped rolling post oak savannah supporting mainly post oak, blackjack oak, yaupon, and bluestem grasses. The property is so named as it is bordered by Four Mile Creek and traversed by two other spring-fed creeks.

Curry Lake II Preserve	Montgomery	19	An adjacent addition to the original Curry Lake Preserve easement, this property includes 1.21 acres of forested wetlands. The tract contains impressive mature black walnut, water hickory and bald cypress trees.
Cypress Creek Preserve	Harris	300	The property is bounded on the west side by approximately 7,000 feet of frontage on Cypress Creek. The landowner provides planned, educational trips to the public for education on the vanishing Katy Prairie ecosystem.
Curry Lake III Preserve	Montgomery	8	A second buffer tract to Curry Lake, this property includes 2 acres of forested wetlands and 5 acres of upland forest. This property also contains a high number of stands of silver bells, <i>Halesia diptera</i> .
Thomas E. and Frances E. Collier Foyt Preserve	Robertson	346.57	Agriculturally developed and undeveloped forested land including a unique hydrological area of the Little Brazos River watershed with three streams converging to the Little Brazos River, with river frontage on both sides within the property.
Banana Bend Nature Preserve	Harris	456.63	The easement area is a unique, diverse ecological area with 7 different ecosystems. The property is the home of the new Champion for the Harris County Tree Registry - a 68 ft. high 73" in circumference and an average crown spread of 67 ft - river birch.
City of Cleveland Preserve	Liberty	5	The City owns this property at the east fork of the San Jacinto River just under the bridge of 105. This tract is now open to the public for low-impact hiking and nature observation and is open for kayakers and canoeists as a launching site.
South Warren Ranch Preserve	Harris	500	This preserve provides critical bird habitat, due in large part to the historical landscape mosaic of small depressional wetlands, grasslands and agricultural rice production. It also performs the important function of retaining and absorbing floodwater within the Cypress Creek watershed.
McCain Creek Preserve	Washington	326.297	The McCain Creek Preserve features close to two miles of linear creek frontage of McCain Creek and provides capacity to retain and absorb floodwaters in the Lake Somerville watershed. The property has a large double-stemmed live oak and close to 100 different flower species.
Peckinpaugh Preserve	Montgomery	25	The Peckinpaugh Preserve is an important addition to the Spring Creek Greenway Project. Donated to Montgomery in two pieces: 10 from a private citizen and 15 from Houston Audubon, the tract is open to the public for low-impact access.
Bahr Woods Preserve	Montgomery	915	This Preserve includes more than 10,000 linear feet of river frontage along the west fork of the San Jacinto River, and 119 acres of palustrine wetlands. It holds numerous large-size trees including the new Montgomery County Champion Hercules Club (<i>Zanthoxylum clava-herculis</i>) – 7' circumference, 11' average crown spread and 25 ft. high.

Clear Creek Preserve	Harris	144.492	The Clear Creek Preserve is the first conservation easement on Clear Creek. The property contains 29 tree species, and 80 species of flowering plants including "Ladies tresses", a rare white orchid.
Mussel Pond Preserve	Harris	22.764	This Montgomery-County owned property is so-named because of special mussels (Little Spectacle cases, <i>Villosa lienosa</i>) found next to the 4.3 acre pond located in the center of the property. The Preserve is home to 36 native tree species including honeylocust and southern catalpa.
Old Riley Fuzzel Rd. Preserve	Montgomery	6.869	This addition to the Spring Creek Greenway Project is the first public canoe/kayak launch site on the Montgomery County side of Spring Creek. The property is just upstream from the Peckinpaugh Preserve and contains close to 30 native tree species including red maple and winged elm.
Stewart Preserve	Montgomery	130.9325	This property is home to a number of unique trees including the current #2 in size Texas State Champion Cedar Elm, as well as a noteworthy (pending Montgomery County Champion) Green Ash.
Prairie Cove Preserve	Harris	7.542	The Prairie Cove Preserve is located just upstream from Armand Bayou Nature Center, the largest urban wildlife refuge in the United States. This small tract is unique in that it contains three distinct ecosystems including 23 different native tree species.
Little Cypress Creek Preserve	Harris	57.983	Open to the public during weekends, visitors can enjoy the diverse ecology of Little Cypress creek. This tract contains over 100 plant species and 30 native tree species, including Flowering dogwood and Black walnut. One might also spot the rare, carnivorous "sundew" plant.
Spindletop Preserve	Jefferson	641.852	With 40 different coastal marsh grass species, this property provides crucial migratory stop-over, nesting and wintering areas for several birds. Nelson's sharp-tailed sparrow, a species of concern, has been spotted on this tract
Bald Cypress Preserve	Montgomery	11.29	The preserve was named for the large Bald cypress trees found on the property, one species among several types of native trees present. This tract is part of the Spring Creek Greenway Project, an effort to connect the frontage green space along Spring Creek in both Harris and Montgomery Counties.
Jefferson County Preserve	Jefferson	1,955.54	Legacy Land Trust's largest preserve, serves as an important flood zone, protecting areas both upstream and downstream. There are natural sloughs on the tract that are rather unique with a high density of red maple and laurel oak swampy areas which, are becoming rare in the Houston region.
Pecan Manor Preserve	Fort Bend	30.8341	This preserve is located near the Brazos River. The conservation values include more than 24 native tree species including a uniquely large area of rusty blackhaw, and an especially large red mulberry noted by the Texas Forest Service.

Lake Creek Preserve	Montgomery	64.09	A unique, diverse ecological area with 41 different native tree species and 15.246 acres of mosaic wetlands. This property has been donated to Montgomery County for permanent protection by Woodforest Development Ltd.
West Fork San Jacinto Preserve	Montgomery	87.72	The West Fork San Jacinto Preserve is located in the San Jacinto River watershed of Montgomery County. With more than 90% of the acreage in the floodway, this preserve provides floodbuffer protection for nearby upstream and downstream residents
